Sir,

I had the Honor to receive a Letter from you enclosing the Memorial presented to the Lord Lieutenant on behalf of Mary Tranor, a Prisoner in the Gaol of the County of Down. The Letter and the Memorial came to my hands at Newry, when I was engaged at the Sessions- and I regret to say, I have lost both.

As to the case of the Prisoner, I beg to state for the information of His Excellency, that I am of opinion Mary Tranor is not a proper object of mercy. She was convicted of Larceny at the last Newry Quarter Sessions, and sentenced to be transported for seven years. James Convey was the prosecutor, a young man. His Coat, Watch and some other articles were all take away on the night of the 9th of Sept^r and on the next night the Prisoner was arrested by a Watchman in the Tower of Newry, she then had a Bundle containing all the stolen things. She was arrested at a [late?] House of the Night. The house of Convey had been carefully shut on the night of the 9th and no one could tell how the prisoner got into it. But in the morning the watch & the clothes were all gone and the door open.

The Prisoner is a young woman destitute of character, well known to the Police. She never had been convicted in the County of Down before, but she had often been in custody, & had been tried & convicted of Larceny in the adjoining County of Armagh. In that case, she had contrived to enter a man's House at night, I believe, by the Chimney, and she deprived him of some valuable property.
